<b>October 8</b>	<b>Local Road Safety Plans</b>
	<p><b>8:00 am   York Township   190 Oak Road, Dallastown, PA (course)</b></p> <p><b>12:00 pm   York Township   190 Oak Road, Dallastown, PA (meeting)</b></p> <p><i>Patrick Wright, LTAP Technical Expert</i></p> <p>This course will teach participants how to develop a local road safety plan that provides a framework for identifying, analyzing, and prioritizing safety improvements on local roads. The content of a local road safety plan is tailored to local issues and needs and will vary accordingly. The process of developing a plan results in a prioritized list of issues, safety concerns, actions, and improvements, which can then be used to reduce fatalities and serious injuries on local roads.</p> <p>This course is based on the Federal Highway Administration's Local Road Safety Plan Guidebook, the PennDOT Strategic Highway Safety Plan, and other relevant resources. Municipalities should consider developing a local road safety plan to use as a tool for reducing fatalities, injuries, and crashes, and properly allocating limited safety resources. The plan should be viewed as a living document that can be updated to reflect changing local needs and priorities.</p> <p><b><u>REGISTRATION REQUIRED</u></b></p>
<b>November 12</b>	<b>Short Span (under 20 feet) Bridge Inspections</b>

Bridge Engineer</i></p> <p>Short-span bridges, classified as under 20 feet in length, though critical to our transportation network, often suffer from neglect because their inspections are not federally regulated. These bridges serve as essential connectors between state, county, and municipal roads that we rely on every day.</p> <p>While inspections for these structures maintain the same level of care and attention as those for larger, federally regulated bridges, the process is streamlined. Reduced paperwork and simplified submission requirements significantly lower both costs and time compared to traditional inspection programs.</p>
